Brief Description of the	Under Annex V of the International Convention for the Prevention of
Initiative:	Pollution from Ships, 1973, modified in 1978 (MARPOL 73/78), all ships
	of more than 400 tons or certified to carry more than 15 persons must
	prepare a garbage management plan (from January 2013, all ships of
	more than 100 tons). The discharge at sea of many types of waste, including all plastics, is prohibited. All ships of more than 400 tons must
	carry a garbage record book. In 2012 guidance, IMO calls for ships to
	minimise taking onboard material that could become garbage. In
	addition, under the Directive on Port Reception Facilities (2000/59/EC),
	ships that demonstrate that they have an environmental management
	system that reduces their waste generation can be given reductions in
	port fees. Further guidance on garbage management on ships, and on
	the elements of environmental management systems for ships, could be
	prepared. It would be most useful for guidance to be prepared at EU
	level, e.g. by an EU institution or via the European Certification
	Organisation (CEN).
